

From Dream to Reality



In October 1998, Jean Purvis was vacationing in Hilton Head, South Carolina, and saw an ad in the local paper that said, "Thank you for a day of caring —Volunteers in Medicine." As a doctor's wife, she became curious and visited the Volunteers In Medicine (VIM) clinic. It was there that she learned about Dr. Jack McConnell and how he founded the first VIM clinic in the country.

Jack McConnell was raised in a poor household with six brothers and sisters by loving parents who taught their family the necessity of caring for those less fortunate. In addition to his parents, Jack was deeply inspired by Dr. Albert Schweitzer, a missionary in Africa. Jack noted that Dr. Schweitzer emphasized to those in health care the need to help those who had no access to health care. An event that impacted the young Dr. McConnell was when he offered some hitchhikers a ride

and learned that they had no health care or access to any medications.

Dr. McConnell's research found that the same was true for more than a third of those living on Hilton Head Island. Wondering why no one did anything about the problem, he quickly realized that HE should be that someone. Dr. McConnell recruited retired doctors, nurses, and volunteers to provide their services at no charge and eventually raised enough money to build a state-of-the-art clinic which serves thousands of people each year at no cost. Volunteers in Medicine opened on Hilton Head in 1994 and has been such a success that it became a model for 41 other clinics across the country.

Greatly inspired and motivated by Dr. McConnell's story and the VIM clinic that she visited in South Carolina, Jean returned home and wasted no time in beginning to make her dream a reality. She contacted longtime friend John Righetti, former vice president of strategic relationship management for Butler Health System, and Dr. Robert McKee. The three became an initial driving force for what was to eventually become the Community Health Clinic of Butler County. Dr. McKee contacted several retired and active physicians and his guidance throughout the beginning stages of planning was invaluable.

Ken Bennett soon joined the team. A newly retired corporate head living in Slippery Rock, Ken brought in a mix of business acumen and community concerns to the table. An incident that impacted Ken was when he met a young woman with a badly swollen jaw caused by an infected wisdom tooth. When he recommended that she have it pulled, she said she couldn't afford to. This was Ken's first encounter with the lack of healthcare for so many.

A survey of Butler County residents determined that nearly 11,000 were without insurance because they couldn't afford it, they didn't qualify for medical assistance, or their employers did not offer it.


