## HIPAA • REVIEW

It's always a good time to brush up on **HIIPAA**. While most people know the term, many do not fully understand **HIIPAA**. **HIIPAA** was enacted in 1996 with the goal of making health care in America more streamlined, efficient and secure. Originally known as the Kennedy-Kassebaum Bill, the **Health Imsurance Portability and Accountability Act** is a set of regulations with a two-pronged purpose: 1. Help patients' health insurance move with them and streamline the transfer of medical records from one health care institution to the another 2. Create standards for managing medical records to protect and enforce patient's right to have their medical records and personal health information kept private.

**HIPAA** was designed to ensure that the patients' healthcare information is only accessed and shared with the patient's permission, and only in the following contexts:

- Coordinating information about care and treatment
- Providing information to family, significant other, or friends who are directly involved in the patient's treatment
- Assessing the quality of care provided by the doctor or healthcare facility
- Relaying any information requested by law enforcement agencies

# The sharing of patients' personal information in <u>any</u> other context is unlawful and can lead to heavy fines and even heavier settlements. Violations can mean time in jail and fines from \$100 to \$1,500,000.

What information is protected? The Privacy Rule protects all "*individually identifiable health information*" held or transmitted by a covered entity or its business associate, in any form or media, whether electronic, paper, or oral. The Privacy Rule calls this information "protected health information (PHI).

**"Individually Identifiable Health Information"** is information, including demographic data, that relates to:

- the individual's past, present or future physical or mental health or condition,
- the provision of health care to the individual, or
- the past, present, or future payment for the provision of health care to the individual,
- and that identifies the individual or for which there is a reasonable basis to believe it can be used to identify the individual. Individually identifiable health information includes many common identifiers (e.g., name, address, birth date, Social Security Number).

Our first priority is always the safety of our staff, volunteers and patients. Recently, our security company, Guardian, updated some of our panic buttons. The panic buttons are only to be used for an extreme emergency - when pressed, it sends a signal directly to Guardian which then <u>automatically</u> contacts the police.
